Biographical/Historical Note

Charles C. Lewis was born in Charleston, S.C. in 1943 and enlisted in the United States Navy in 1961. He attended recruit training and Navy Hospital Corps School at Great Lakes Naval Training Center in Illinois. From 1962 to 1964 he was assigned to the Charleston Naval Hospital in South Carolina as a hospital corpsman. He left active duty to attend college and received his degree from Newberry College in Newberry, South Carolina (B.A., 1969). In 1971 he received a certificate from the Duke University Medical Center Physician Assistant Program. He later went on to receive the Master of Public Health degree from the University of South Carolina.

After graduating from the Duke University Medical Center Physician Assistant program, Lewis joined the faculty body of the University of Texas Southwestern Medical Center-Dallas Physician Assistant Program. From 1974 to 2004, he taught in Physician Assistant programs at the Medical University of South Carolina, Charleston, the Medical College of Georgia, East Carolina University, Nova Southeastern University, and Methodist College.

In between his faculty positions, Lewis was commissioned as a Lieutenant Junior Grade in the position of Environmental Health Officer for the Medical Service Corps. His duties were to provide preventive medicine support to deployed Marine Corps units and to train Navy medical personnel in preventive medicine. He served two tours as commanding officer of the Preventive Medicine Section, 4th Medical Battalion, Force Service Support Group, 4th Marine Division. In 1996 he was promoted to the rank of Commander (CDR) and retired at that rank in 1998. Lewis is working on his PhD dissertation.
