By increasing diversity in the profession, we can improve healthcare delivery and improve provider competence.

In the NCCPA's 2018 Statistical Profile of Certified Physician Assistants, the overall results were as follows: Most PAs are white women. The breakdown: 68.8 percent of PAs are female; 31.2 percent are male. By race, PAs are white: 86.9 percent, Asian: 5.8 percent; African American: 3.6 percent; Native American: 0.4 percent; and Hawaiian/Pacific Islander: 0.3 percent.

The U.S. Census of 2018 ¹ shows percentages of inhabitants as 76.5 percent white; 13.5 percent African American; 18.2 percent Hispanic or Latino. Diversity is important to improve healthcare delivery and improve provider competence. The updated version of the definition of diversity by R. Baki, Lippincott, 7/11/18 ²:

"This definition in no way abandons the existing focus of diversity efforts. Critical work remains, and must continue, in including and supporting historically underrepresented groups in the workplace on dimensions such as race, gender, sexual orientation, disability and more. But an expanded definition of diversity encompasses these identities and brings them together with more broadly defined perspectives. Bringing these many backgrounds together activates a broader set of employees within 'diversity' initiatives, ultimately fostering a healthier and

more progressive workplace where top talent wants to be."

So, what do we do to increase the numbers of providers to try to match the demographics of the U.S.? One suggestion is for our Trustees and the PA community to get involved with PAEA's Project Access. Think about it. You can change the face of health care!

Timi Agar Barwick, CEO of the Physician Assistant Education Association (PAEA, formerly the Association of PA Programs [APAP]), retired June



30, 2019 after a 27-year career. When Timi began her fulltime career at APAP in 1992, she and one other staff member led 54 PA education programs with a

\$300,000 budget in space leased from the American Academy of Physician Assistants. When she retired this year, there were 238 PA education programs led by 40 staff members with a \$10 million budget in a Washington, DC building shared with the Association of American Medical Colleges and other health related associations. The profession thanks Timi for her countless contributions to the admission, diversity, and education of PA students nationwide. Switzerland, The Swiss know how to stay out of the fray and focus on what's important. On the surface at least, they seem to be embracing cultural diversity with German, French, and Italian influences all working together in different places.

Three Women Physicians Who Pioneered PA Education

The PA History Society recently posted biographies for three pioneering female physicians who were instrumental in establishing PA programs during the formative years of the PA profession. The three include Dr. Margaret K. Kirklin from the University of Alabama, Birmingham (UAB), Dr. Katherine Anderson from the Bowman Gray School of Medicine (BGSM, now Wake Forest University) in Winston-Salem, NC and Dr. Frances "Fran" Horvath from St. Louis University (SLU) in St. Louis, Missouri.

Although Dr. John W. Kirklin conceived the idea of formally educating Surgeon Assistants (SAs), his wife, Dr. Margaret Kirklin, a general internist by training, was given the responsibility for overseeing the program's development. She assumed directorship of the 2-year program in 1968 and developed a distinct didactic curriculum taught by her and other members of the Medical School faculty. She remained the program's director until 1974. In 1968, the newly appointed Director of Allied Health at BGSM, Dr. Leland Powers, asked Dr. Katherine Anderson, a pediatrician, to help develop a curriculum to educate Pediatric PAs, similar to the Child Health Associate Program being developed by Dr. Henry Silver at the University of Colorado.

By the time the program accepted its first eight students in 1969, the curriculum was broadened to educate physician assistants as generalists and not just pediatricians. Dr. Anderson served as the program's Medical Director until her retirement in 1976. Another pediatrician, Dr. Frances Horvath, helped establish the physician assistant program at SLU and served as the program's Medical Director from 1973-1993 and as Chairman of the Department for PA Education from 1974-1980. She also has the distinction of being the first woman to serve as President of the Association of Physician Assistant Programs (APAP, now PAEA) in 1978.



From the Archives: Treasures from the Booth

Though the AAPA conference was several months ago, the memories of it still remain... in the form of some very thoughtful and awesome donations to the PA History Society archives!

The African Heritage Caucus did a tribute to Prentiss Harrison, the first African American PA, who passed late last year. Afterward, the Caucus donated framed photographs of Harrison, the Memorial



Resolution of Condolence, and a certificate awarded to him for dedication and commitment to professional leadership and the development of personal growth of African Americans.

In addition, two military patches worn by physician assistants stationed at the Al-Asad Airbase Iraq were dropped off at the booth.



Also, one of the most unique donations the PA History Society archives has ever received was presented to the archivist at this conference: the PA Military Dining Out Grog Shoe. The bronzed shoe



with accompanying plaque commemorates the first ever Dining Out at the AAPA Conference in 1998. A grog is part of a military dining out celebration where different types of alcohol are mixed in a big bowl from which participants must drink...

apparently sometimes out of a shoe that will later on be bronzed. The archivist of the Society was delighted with this new addition to the Society's collections.

<u>Feedback</u>: The benefits of the Affordable Care Act of 1999 for PAs are:

It formally recognizes PAs as one of three primary healthcare professions in the U.S., along with physicians and NPs.

It provides financial support for the education of PAs who intend to provide primary care services, especially in rural and underserved communities.

It provides a five-year, 10 % Medicare incentive payment for certain primary care services provided by PAs, as well as other primary care providers, for whom at least 60 % of services are in primary care.

It calls for the "Explicit integration of PAs into newly established models of team-based coordinated care, including Patient-Centered Medical Homes (PCMHs) and Accountable Care Organizations (ACOs)"

By acknowledging the critical role of PAs in the healthcare workforce, the ACA sets the stage for reducing barriers to PA practice in state laws and regulations.



Honor Military and Uniformed Services PAs with an Engraved Brick Paver

The Veterans Memorial Garden located at the Stead Center/NCAPA Headquarters in Durham, NC, is the *only* garden dedicated to veteran and uniformed services PAs. The centerpiece of the garden is a life size bronze statue of a combat medic bandaging the wounds of a fallen solider. The sculpture is titled "Life Savers Then ... Caregivers Now" and serves as a reminder of the origins of the PA profession. Engraved named pavers are embedded in the walkway and surrounding patio to honor veteran PAs and their service to our country.

The engraved 9×9 pavers are available for purchase. For those interested in purchasing more than one paver we offer a sliding scale: 1 for \$100, 2 for \$175, 3 for \$250, 4 for \$325 and 5 for \$400. The engraved paver will include the appropriate uniformed service logo and 3 lines for name, branch and years of service.








The Adventures of Chipper Wallet, PA-C

Chipper Wallet is a character from the nationally syndicated comic strip, Gasoline Alley. In 1968, Chipper Wallet joined the Navy, became a hospital corpsman, and was sent to Vietnam. When he came home in the early 1970s, he joined one of the early Physician Assistant programs on the advice of the town doctor. Chipper Wallet is credited with being one of the major influences in pop culture that brought the PA profession to the attention of the public. Chipper Wallet has a fond place in the hearts of many pioneering PAs as his journey to become a PA mirrors their own.
