The PA History Society is accepting applications for an individual with a passion for the history of the PA profession. This is a part-time, hourly independent contractor position, without benefits. This independent contractor position is renewable annually. This part-time position will serve in the role of Historian. As a paid member of the [PAHx team](#), the Historian will work with our staff members and the Board of Trustees.

The Historian is required to work a minimum of 6 hours a week, remotely, and travel to the Johns Creek, GA office 2-3 times a year to work on specified projects as needed. Minimum qualifications include:

- Proven leadership, communication, research, writing and publication skills.
 - Writing samples requested with application.
- Candidate must be a PA with a strong connection to the current developments happening throughout the PA community and the national PA organizations.
- A solid knowledge base of the PA profession's 55-year history and the recent PA history from the past two decades (2000s & 2010s).
- Self-motivated with the ability to work under minimal supervision and handle multiple priorities with a strong attention to detail.

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- Proficiency in Microsoft Office applications (Word, Outlook, Excel, PowerPoint), Adobe Acrobat, ZOOM conferencing, and social media (Facebook, Twitter, Instagram).

Message from the President

As we head into the “Dog Days of Summer”, there just seems to be more heating up around us than the weather. COVID is still a concern, and our practices and hospitals still have more than enough to handle. Monkeypox is now a disease to be reckoned with on our own shores.

Natural disasters such as floods and wildfires have led to human tragedy. Mass shootings continue to be in the headlines and the war in Ukraine makes us gasp and shake our head in disbelief. And then there is inflation. It can all be pretty depressing. What is a person to do to deal with the stress induced by all of these issues and more?

In 2011, Dr. Carter joined the staff of the Society as Historian Emeritus. During his service to the PAHx, Reg (as we know him) has contributed nearly 100 biographies, conducted over 55 oral history interviews, written over 60 articles for *Historical Happenings*, and contributed significantly to the development of the Educational Learning Modules, Historian Toolkit, Historian Boot Camps, book publications (*The Physician Assistant: An Illustrated History*, *The Adventures of Chipper Wallet, PA-C* and *Physician Assistants as Social Innovators in Healthcare*) and much more! In this, the Society’s 20th Anniversary year, Dr. Carter has determined that it is time for him to put the cap back on the ink well. It was with “considerable thought and mixed emotions” that he recently shared with the PAHx Board of Trustees that he would not be renewing his contract for 2023. We wish him all the happiness he deserves and safe travels. He will be missed, but I am sure we will hear from him again at a place and time more suitable for his new life schedule. The most recent pair was Gail Curtis (2017-2018 AAPA President) and Robert Wooten (2011-2012 AAPA President), both of whom graduated from the Bowman Gray School of Medicine's PA Program (now Wake Forest University) in 1981. It is no surprise that the first 7 presidents of AAPA all graduated from Duke University in either 1968 or 1969. After Roger Whittaker was President from 1976-1977, there would not be another classmate pair

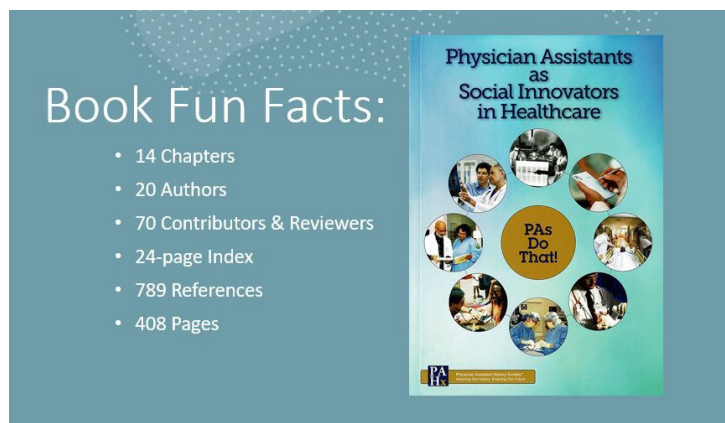
until Elizabeth "Libby" Coyte (1997-1998 AAPA President) and Edward Friedmann (2001-2002 AAPA President); this pair graduated from the University of Iowa in 1977. The next two classmates to be AAPA Presidents would be William Marquardt (1992-1993 AAPA President) and Gregor Bennett (2007-2008 AAPA President), both of whom graduated from the University of Nebraska in 1976. Who will be the next pair to go from classmates to AAPA Presidents? With over 280+ accredited PA programs, the likelihood may be small but not impossible.

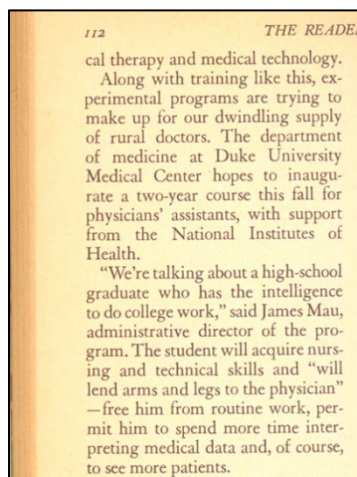
Serendipity

Serendipity (noun) - the occurrence and development of events by chance in a happy or beneficial way.

The first physician assistant students were enrolled at Duke in October 1965. There were four of them, all former Navy Hospital Corpsmen. They paid no tuition and received stipends from a National Heart Institute grant awarded to the Hyperbaric Medicine Division at Duke to train both hyperbaric chamber operators and physician assistants. The founder of the Duke PA Program, Dr. Eugene Stead Jr., had convinced the hyperbaric medicine division's chief, Dr. Herbert Saltzman, to include PAs in his grant. According to the grant, once trained, PAs would remain in the chamber with the patient after treatments thus allowing physicians to depressurize and exit the chamber sooner to continue their day's work. The new PA recruits were promised clinical jobs at Duke if the PA concept failed to gain acceptance and legal recognition.

Serendipitously, the new program to train PAs received national publicity two months prior to starting in October. A freelance writer and roving editor for *Reader's Digest*, Lester Velie, was working



on a series of articles titled "Where the Jobs Are," and by chance called Duke about health-related careers. He was put in touch with Jim Mau, the Department of Medicine's administrator. Mau told him about the new program being established to train ex-military corpsmen to be physician assistants. The

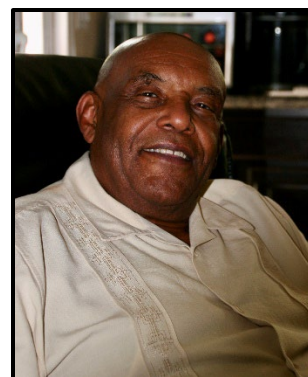
physician assistants would help overworked physicians, especially those in rural practices. Published in August 1965, the article attracted the attention of former corpsmen and potential physician employers. Mau was flooded with over 1,000 letters wanting to know more about the program.

Note: According to his obituary, Velie died at age 96 in 2003. He was born in Kiev, Ukraine and came to the USA with his family at age 6. He grew up in Milwaukee and graduated from the University of Wisconsin in 1929. He published over 200 articles serving as a writer and editor for Reader's Digest, Collier's, New York Journal of Commerce and other publications. He also authored several books. Passages: Steven Turnipseed

Steven Turnipseed, MPH, pioneering PA, passed away on the morning of June 10, 2022, after battling cancer. He is survived by his wife Deborah and children.

Mr. Turnipseed was in the first class at the MEDEX Northwest, University of Washington PA Program in 1969; he was the only African American in his graduating class. Like many early PAs, Turnipseed was a military medic prior to PA school. Turnipseed was in the military for 23 years; ten years



was active duty in the Army and 13 years was with the Reserves.

As a pioneering PA, Mr. Turnipseed was an advocate for expanding the diversity of the profession. While he was serving on the board of the AAPA, he worked with Joyce Nichols, Earl Echard, John

Davis, and Prentiss Harrison to establish the AAPA's Minority Affairs Committee and was later a founding member of the AAPA African American Caucus. He was also a founding member of the Washington State Academy of Physician Assistants and served as the organization's president in 1976.

In addition to his successful primary care practice and many state and national leadership contributions to the PA profession, Mr. Turnipseed was involved with the establishment of the Charles R. Drew University PA Program in Los Angeles, CA, and served on the faculty of the Stonybrook University PA Program in Stony Brook, NY. He was a consultant for many other PA programs that were being developed at that time, as well.

Joyce Nichols and Steve Turnipseed during a Minority Affairs Committee meeting, 1975

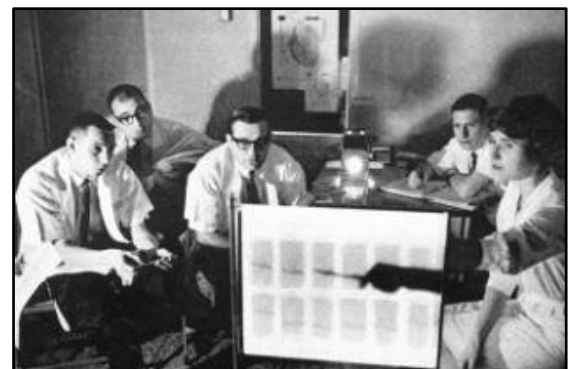
Remembering PA Advocate Kathleen Gainor Andreoli, DSN, FAAN

On August 3, 2022, Kathleen Gainor Andreoli, nurse educator and one of the earliest supporters of the PA profession, died. Andreoli worked together with [Dr. Eugene A. Stead, Jr.](#), to develop the curriculum for the first PA program which was established at Duke University in 1965. She was involved in the establishment of the first coronary care unit at the Duke University Medical Center and co-authored a textbook on coronary care. After leaving Duke University in 1970, Andreoli was involved in the establishment of the first PA program at the University of Alabama, Birmingham, and served as their educational director. Andreoli had a distinguished career as an educator in the nursing and physician assistant professions. 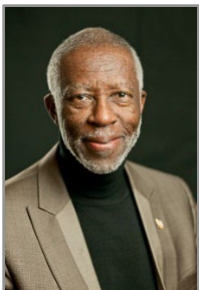

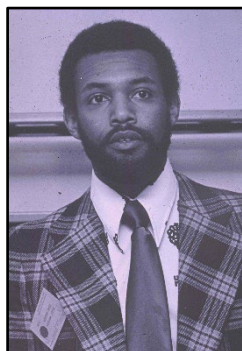

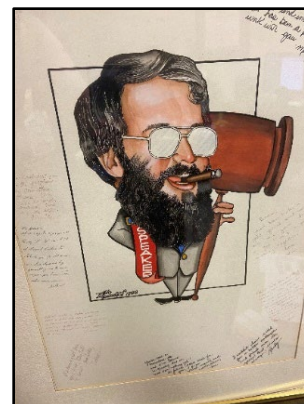

- was instrumental in securing the legislation to allow PAs to practice in Mississippi
- provided ER care to Mississippi Gulf Coast patients during Hurricane Katrina in 2005
- worked at the Biloxi VA Medical Center for 28 years
- was a member of the AAPA House of Delegates for 26 years (1995 – 2021)
- was honored by the city of Biloxi, MS, with a "Proclamation Murl D. Dotson Day" in 2019

US Navy's First PA Graduates

BUMED Washington (NSMN) -- On 31 July 1974, eight hospital corpsmen completed two years of training and were promoted to warrant officers, becoming the first Physician Assistants in the Navy.

Over the past 20 years, the program has had a very stormy course, testified to by its cancellation on three separate occasions. But it survived. And, on 1 September 1989, PAs found a new home in the medical service corps.

Although no longer counted among the Navy's nearly 200 PAs, one of the original eight physician assistant warrant officers is still a certified PA and on active duty: optometrist LCDR Robert Aitken, MSC, officer in charge of Navy Branch Medical Clinic Charleston, SC.

In 1971, the Navy War College released a white paper that recommended the Navy establish a physician assistant program and concluded that the need for such a program was urgent. Upon completion of training, the PAs would be placed in the warrant officer's structure.² In 1972, the Navy negotiated agreements with both George Washington University (GWU) in Washington, DC and the US Air Force to train PAs; 15 students were assigned to GWU while 10 students were sent to the School of Health Care Sciences (SHCS) at Sheppard Air Base in Texas. LCDR Robert Aitken - mentioned in the news release above - graduated from the Sheppard PA Program. He later graduated from the Southern College of Optometry in Memphis, TN in 1984 and continued in private practice in Charleston, SC after retiring from the Navy.³ Dr. Aitken died at age 69 in 2018.⁴



The US Air Force PA Program at Sheppard was fully accredited by the AMA in December 1973. An agreement with the University of Nebraska, Omaha, NE, provided a Bachelor of Science Degree in Medicine to all graduates.⁵ In 1978, the Navy decided to establish two PA programs, one located in Norfolk, VA and the other in San Diego, CA. Both Navy PA programs were accredited in 1980 but, as noted in the news release, were closed and reopened on several occasions throughout the 1980s.⁶

Today, all uniformed service PAs are educated at Fort Sam Houston, TX. The Interservice Physician Assistant Program (IPAP) was formed in 1996.

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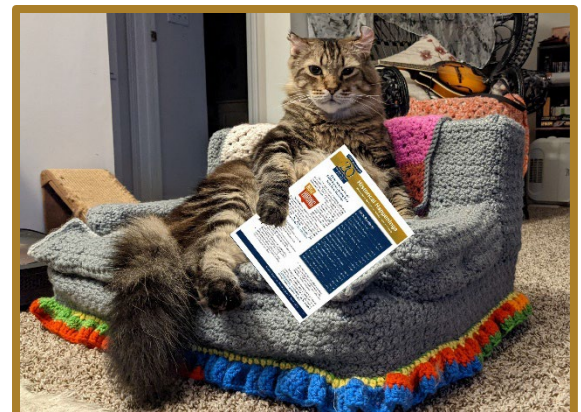

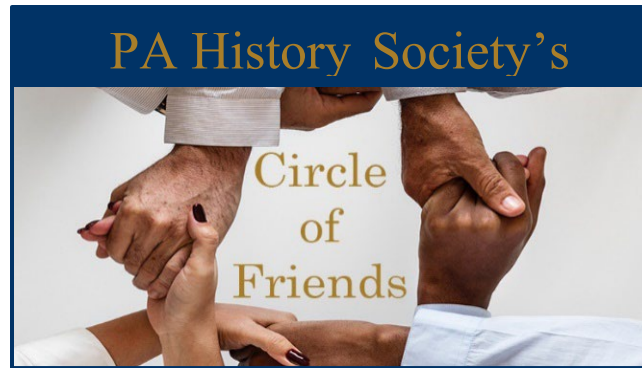
