Society Celebrates Successful Year




Society Board members Combs, Grant, Nelson, and Blessing at AAPA House of Delegates Meeting in Las Vegas

Board passes approval of budget, additional staff, and bylaws change

The Society's Board of Directors met on June 3, 2004, in conjunction with the AAPA Annual Conference, in Las Vegas, NV. In addition to approving the FY05 budget. the Board authorized the signing of a memorandum of understanding Duke University Medical Center (DUMC) Archives to hire an assistant archivist to expand and process the Society's archival collection. Additionally, approved the institution of memo-

randums of understanding with Carter Professional Services, Inc., to direct the PAHx Center because since July 1, 2004, the Society assumed full responsibility for its administration and resources acquisition. Additionally, Carter Professional Services provide the Society's financial and administrative operational activities.

In other actions, the Board endorsed the slate of officers put forth by the Nominations and Elections Committee and the Bylaw amendments recommended by the Bylaws and Policy Committee to add an AAPA seat to the Board of Directors. Please see related articles.


Executive Director provides update on new website design



Society signs agreement with DUMC library/archives

Its official. On May 17 and 18, Ron Nelson and Patricia Thibodeau signed a deed of transfer agreement for the Society and the DUMC Library/ Archives respectively. The agreement begins:

"In consideration of mutual benefits the Society for the Preservation of Physician Assistant History, Inc., later called the SOCIETY, and the Duke University (through its division of Medical Center Archives), later called ARCHIVES, enter into this agreement for

access, use, disposition, and ownership of the SOCIETY'S PAPERS, later called PAPERS."

The Society will retain ownership and physical property rights or the papers and will provide funds to support a full-time special collection archivist to process, catalog and develop finding aids for the collection according to accepted archival standards to assure easy access to the papers. The Society's papers contain both the administrative files of the Society and

also a special collection of related historic materials being assembled by the Society and the Archives. The Archives will ensure that the Society's papers and collection are stored according to accepted archival standards and are accessible through the same access points as other DUMC Archive collections. The Society terminate can agreement at anytime providing it contacts the Archives in writing 30 days prior to the proposed date of cancellation.

AAPA President Visits History Center

In May of this year, then AAPA President, Pam Scott, visited the Physician Assistant History Center on the campus of Duke University School of Medicine. The goals of the visit were to learn more about the Center's activities, to increase communication and collaboration between the two organizations. and determine processes for accomplish them to mutual goals objectives.

Dr. Carter scheduled a full day of activities for Mrs. Scott. They started with a tour of the History Center itself. According to Scott, "It was a wonderful experience...like a kid being turned loose in a toy store. There were old books, photos, journals, individuals' scrapbooks, all kinds of memorabilia, films, patches, pens, and medical implements all of

which were intimately linked with the early history of our wonderful profession. It was totally awesome and I didn't want to leave!"

Next, they met members. Thibodeau. Charlie Lackey, Rusty Koonts and Anne Bushyhead in the Duke University Medical Center (DUMC) Library Classroom. Scott was provided with an overview of the LSTA Digitizing Project. the DUMC Library, online catalog and special collection. DUMC Archives, online tour of archives and special collection, and the **DUMC** Audiovisual Media Services. This was followed by a brief tour of the library. "It was also totally cool", according to Scott. "They had tons of medical books and a minimedical museum. I was astounded by the quantity and detail involved in the

digitalizing of a single article. It is much more complex that sitting a document on the scanner and pressing the 'start' button."

This was followed by a demonstration discussion of the newly updated Illustrated History Website at the hospital, lunch with the PA students Duke at School University Medicine, a visit to the DUMC Archives, and a conference call with then President, Ron Nelson, since unexpected weather prevented him making the visit in person.

"I think what impressed me most during the visit was the enthusiasm and dedication expressed by every member of the team I met," stated Scott, "Everyone involved, even the non-physician assistants, is truly excited to have the opportunity to work on this important project."



Exchangette Club, serving its president and receiving its highest award for outstanding community service.


Persuaded by her husband to help the fledgling Society meet its administrative needs, Sherry says, "I'm glad to have time to help hope that I can contribute to the continued
