# Executive Directions... A Place for My Stuff

A Place for my Stuff is the title of comedian George Carlin's eighth comedy album released in 1981. Although I could do without some his explicit language, Carlin has a knack of satirizing the American mindset and poking fun at the English language.

Stuff is one of those words used when no other word seems to do. We know it as a collection of things or materials. So there is cool stuff, not so cool stuff and that other stuff (akin to so forth, and etc.) Someone has to claim ownership of stuff. So it is his stuff, her stuff or my stuff. When he or she "knows their stuff" or has the "right kind of stuff" – that is a good thing.

Some may believe that an archive, museum or library is just a place to put They are just our stuff. places to "store stuff" until we need it. However, the missions and goals of archives, museums and libraries are not just about storage and retrieval, they are sites of knowledge and learning. For example, the mission of our affiliated archive is "to solicit and collect those materials that document the emergence and development of the physician assistant profession with all of its political, social, economic care health and ramifications. The archive make and obtain for research available tend to materials that

illustrate or describe the nature and activities of the PA profession; its educators, students, practitioners, leaders, supporters and patrons." Our affiliated library and museum exist for academic and research purposes.

We have made major gains this past year and want to keep the momentum going. Our goals for the PAHx Center for FY 2006-2007 are as follows:

- Add between 50 to 75 linear feet of materials to our archival collection, including documents, photos and artifact.
- Create at least 25 new biographical files and post 20 new biographical sketches on our PAHx Center Website.
- Create 3 to 5 on-line learning modules on the

- history of the PA Profession for PA students.
- Conduct 5 to 10 oral histories with transcripts.
- Foster at least six new research studies on the professional development of PAs and their impact on the delivery of health care services.

Academic and research activities are labor intensive and are costly. This is why it is important that our members join efforts to recruit new members to the Society. The more people we have the more we can accomplish. So I encourage each one of you to make it your goal this year to bring one or two new members into the Society. By doing so, you will help us "strut our stuff".

## The Archivist's Corner... Not All Records Are Created Equal. . .

day-to-day During operations organizations generate copious records. What do I mean by records? Let me clarify, according to the Society of American Archivists, a record is "a created document received and maintained by an agency, organization, or individual in pursuance of legal obligations or in the transaction of business". So a record could be anything from email correspondence to financial information.

records have Which lasting permanent historical value? These are that records information or insight into the founding or operation of organization, adminidecisions/actions. and policies or procedures. Some of these records include Board of Director's minutes, committee meeting minutes, administrative and correspondence, agendas, annual reports, organizational by-laws, articles of constitutions, incorporation, grants, insurance policies, final reports or recommendations, lists of committee and officers members etc. This is not a comprehensive list so if there is some doubt or question about a specific document it is best to err on the side of

## What is in your Boxes?

It is a simple question but often hard to answer for someone who has inherited an organization's papers collected and stored over a period of thirty plus years. immediately went to work looking over materials in the The next day we office. accompanied Tim and Jonna Holden to Rockville, MD to assess what was in the boxes that the Association staff had archival identified material. We loaded 20 plus boxes in the back of our minivan to bring back to the Durham office to assess and re-box if necessary.

We found Board of Director Meeting Books, Business Meeting Books, newsletters. minutes. reports correspondence from the time periods we were interested in preserving. duplicate found copies of recent material, but only one copy of material source from the 1970s dating

and 1980s. Our initial that assessment is has Association collection of extensive archival material that is still in good condition, but is deteriorating rapidly because of the way it is being currently maintained and stored.

Since we did not have time to organize, process and analyze the material in Alexandria, we brought the boxes back to the PA History Center to complete the initial process. PAEA will explore with the the DUMC Society and archives the possibility of having the Society take responsibility for papers Association's and of archival collection material. This would include writing finding aids for the staff. so that collection researchers and interested persons easily assess the materials in the future.


